

1.2 Introduction

We would like to acknowledge that the Bluff is on the lands of the Ramindjeri and Ngarrindjeri people, the Traditional Custodians of the land and surrounding waters where we live and work. We acknowledge their deep connection to country and pay our respects to Elders past, present and emerging.

The Bluff Master Plan has been led by Hatch in collaboration with the City of Victor Harbor. Acknowledgment extends to the local community, stakeholders and visitors who have provided input and provided significant support for the development of a master plan for the Bluff.



## 1.0 Background

### 1.3 Executive summary

The Bluff, also known as Rosetta Head or Kongkengguwar, is a much loved and iconic Victor Harbor landmark. It has significant environmental, recreation, tourism, heritage and cultural value. In recognition of this, the City of Victor Harbor has engaged Hatch, to assist in preparing a master plan for the Bluff that sets out a shared vision for this important asset. Without a robust and well considered master planning approach for the future, the demands on the Bluff are likely to create conflicting social, cultural, environmental and economic impacts. Developing a master plan for the Bluff requires an open dialogue with all those who care about the Bluff and its future. The consultation process, key findings and outcomes outlined in this report builds on a process where collective conversations, issues and opportunities are heard equally ensuring that no one voice dominates.

Hatch in association with the City of Victor Harbor undertook extensive engagement to seek input into understand what a shared vision for the Bluff would look like and how this could inform a master plan. More than 700 diverse stakeholders came together to provide input, identify strategic goals and objectives, express concerns, discuss and test opportunities, to support the development of a master plan. The engagement process focused on a three part approach, each of which intertwined to ensure a circular dialogue.

The following (8) high-level themes have been identified to reflect the sentiment and nature of feedback received:

- 1. Celebrating diverse views, vistas & outlooks
- 2. Improving trails, tracks and links
- 3. Re-wilding the site
- 4. Limiting development, commercialism and built form
- 5. Supporting places for contemplation, escape and clarity
- 6. Layering, discovering and uncovering rich narratives, stories and histories
- 7. Strengthening connection to rugged and wild landscape
- 8. Enhancing connection to marine environment

This Community Consultation Key Findings Report provides summary of the consultation approach, key findings and mater plan considerations as part of the process so far. Information contained within this report will be used to:

- Provide Council and the community with a summary of 'what we heard' building on community and stakeholder consultation.
- Provide an understanding to the needs and requirements of the Bluff, its community, residents and visitors.
- Provide a platform to test engagement results through the master plan to ensure the desired and appropriate outcomes are achieved.
- Support the development of the draft master plan.
- Identify areas where further studies, conversations or involvement is required.





## 2.0 Engagement

### 2.1 Engagement Process

The engagement process has focused on a three part approach, each of which intertwined to ensure a circular dialogue, continual learning and asking the right questions.

Each phase of the engagement process aimed to build on 'local' knowledge of the Bluff, to better understand the ongoing efforts, concerns and hopes of the wider community. Hatch, acknowledges that successful projects are achieved through shared conversations, local knowledge exchange and a willingness to 'unlearn' conventional wisdom. Through community inclusion, engagement and collaborative consultation processes big ideas are balanced with pragmatic considerations. The approach focuses on a key value, 'to listen', enabling the design team to hear directly from community with regards to their preferences and desired experiences to develop a shared vision.

**Part A:** To begin a conversation with all those who care about the Bluff, a community and stakeholder survey was released via Council's Your Say page. Hard copies were also provided at the Council Office. The survey was released for public consultation for three weeks (05 May - 29 May 2022). A total of 639 submissions were received demonstrating the passion of the local community and its visitors.

Part B: As part of the stakeholder engagement process a number of workshops, meetings and conversations have occurred with a diverse range of stakeholders not limited to, Coastcare, The Department for Environment and Water, Hills and Fleurieu Landscape Board, Native Vegetation Council, Coastal Protection Board, Council Elected Members and Council Staff. A number of stakeholder site walkovers have been undertaken which have focused on opportunities for balancing impacts to the environment, preservation and protection, existing assets, cultural narratives and histories and inclusion and all abilities access. By walking the site, the team has been able to gain intimate knowledge of the Bluff, and begin to better understand some of the issues and opportunities that need to be considered.

The project team has engaged with a number of First Nations representatives. This has included meeting with the Ramindjeri Heritage Association (03 June) which identified further opportunity for a site walkover (16 June). A start up meeting with the Ngarrindjeri Aboriginal Corporation undertaken (10 June) with a collaborative workshop scheduled (23 June). Council staff have also attempted to make contact with the Ngarrindjeri Regional Authority (NRA) which remains ongoing.

Part C: As part of the community consultation process, Community Design Workshops were held on Friday 27th of May and Saturday 28th of May, at the Coral Street Arts Space, located in Victor Harbor. A 2-hour drop in session was also held at the Petrel Cove shelters on Friday 27th of May. Workshops built on the information gathered as part of the community engagement survey and encouraged locals, stakeholders and visitors to attend a 50-minute workshop with groups of up to 15 people. Over the two-day event, more than 75+ community members were involved as part of the collaborative design and learning process.





### 2.2 Community & stakeholder survey

Through the City of Victor Harbor's 'Your Say' platform and available hard copies, a total of **639** survey responses were received. Interested to understand what makes the Bluff a great place, the community were asked to share why the Bluff is important to them, things they liked and things they would change. The survey provides insight to identify areas of cultural, community and historic value, and to better understand the challenges and issues the community face. The responses provide an understanding into the potential tension points between the community, which need to be considered and balanced in the master plan. The survey asked the following (10) key questions;

- 1. Why is the Bluff important to you? (e.g. what makes it special)
- 2. What do you LIKE about the Bluff? (e.g. views, walking, culture, history, beaches)
- **3.** What are some things that you WOULD CHANGE about the Bluff? (e.g. what isn't working, what could be improved?)
- **4.** What is your big idea or vision for the Bluff? (e.g. If you were developing a master plan for the Bluff, what might you suggest?)
- 5. What don't you want to see happen to the Bluff?
- 6. What activities do you currently enjoy doing at the Bluff?
- 7. What activities would you like to be able to do at the Bluff in the future?
- 8. What else should we be thinking about when developing a masterplan for the Bluff?(e.g. what is missing, what else should be considered?)
- 9. How often do you visit the Bluff?
- 10. How do you usually get to the Bluff

Survey participants represented a diverse spectrum of users. Under 40 years olds were represented with 21% of responses. 60-69 year olds represented the largest group (22%). Participants aged 50+ contributed to over 50% of survey responses. Of the community who provided a postcode, 70% of respondents were residents of Victor Harbor, Encounter Bay, Port Elliot, Hayborough, Middleton, Goolwa and McCracken of those, 38% indicated they were residents of Victor Harbor. Responses were also provided across the state from a range of suburbs including Hyde Park, Echunga, Reynella to name a few.



### 2.4 Why is the Bluff important to you? (e.g. what makes it special)

From unique stories, histories and memories, to reinforcing the a sense of natural rugged beauty. Survey responses reinforced that the Bluff is a special and diverse place for many people. The following provides summary of the (9) common themes identified by participants.

- 1. Spectacular views, vistas & outlooks
- 2. A place for contemplation, escape and relaxation- A place to think
- 3. It's absence of built form and limited development
- 4. Sense of rugged, wild and natural beauty
- 5. Rich with cultural significance, histories, narratives and stories (past, present and
- 6. emerging
- 7. A place that encourages a connection to the natural environment
- 8. An iconic, emblematic and unique natural landmark which underpins Victor Harbor's identity
- 9. A place which supports a diverse range of activities and users

Building on 'Why is the Bluff important', a snapshot of responses are provided below to illustrate 'what we heard'. Reinforcing the key themes above, comments focused on views, natural beauty, an unspoilt rugged landscape along with the absence of development and built form.

- "It is a stunningly beautiful and so far, unspoilt, location with magnificent views"
- "Uninterrupted views of our spectacular coastline and beyond"
- "It frames the west of the bay with a dramatic, beautiful presence"
- "It is one of the only places that you can still enjoy some peace and quiet in this area"
- "Lovely area to go for contemplation, a place to reflect"
- "A place to remember past times"
- "It's perfect for my mental health"
- "It's a calming place for me"
- "It is the most relaxing and inspiring place to sit and enjoy the magnificent views"
- "A significant cultural site. It has immense significance to First Nation People and an
- important historical heritage that is vital to the beginnings of what we know as Victor
- Harbor"
- "It's unspoiled"
- "It's not ruined by tourism gimmicks"
- "It is free of commercial buildings"
- "It has not been tainted by the need to 'develop' it into a tourist destination"
- "It's raw natural beauty & significance"
- "Fresh Air and nature at its finest"
- "It is really special wild place of natural beauty"
- "It's natural unadulterated beauty"
- "The kelp Forrest below the jetty"

### 2.5 What do you like about the Bluff?

Building on why the Bluff is important, the community was asked what they liked about the Bluff. Responses reiterated the importance of views, vantage and lookouts, indicated more than 400 times. Responses reinforced the role the Bluff has in supporting active recreation of walking, hiking and running, reflected in over 300 comments. The absence of commercial development and built form was also well represented, reinforced through comments indicating the importance of celebrating a wild environment and supporting a connection to landscape. The following articulates (10) common themes identified by participants. Themes are not provided in any particular order.

- 1. Views, vantage and lookout points
- 2. Peacefulness, tranquility, quietness and atmosphere
- 3. It's simplicity
- 4. Walking, hiking, climbing, exploring and active recreation.
- 5. An untouched natural and wild environment
- 6. History and culture (European and First Nations)
- 7. Importance of cultural connection for First Nations
- 8. Connection to the landscape, flora and fauna
- Access to the ocean, beaches and marine environments (surfing, swimming, scuba, snorkeling, kayaking)
- 10. Symbolic to Victor Harbor and it physical shape and form

A snapshot of responses are provided below to illustrate 'what we heard'. Reinforcing the key themes above, comments focused on the tranquility and atmosphere, a place to site and look out. Responses also highlighted the significance of environmental, social, cultural, historical and spiritual connections.

- "A peaceful & beautiful site to walk, sit, and breathe in the clean salty air off the ocean"
- "Raw ruggedness, the natural untouched beauty"
- "The tranquility, peace, the outlook and cultural significance"
- "History for Indigenous people and early settlers"
- "Watching the whales and the views are just stunning. Nature at its finest"
- "The one sliver along the coast that remains undeveloped"
- "It is an icon of the area"
- "The environment it creates, it's beautiful and should remain unspoilt"
- "It's a place to experience solitude, to be amongst nature, but also to share and teach the
- next generation"
- "Environmental significance"
- "Knowing nothing is between you and Antarctica"
- "Scuba diving experience"
- "Climbing up and sitting on the granite boulders watching the clouds drift by"
- "It's untouched wilderness"
- "It's a beautiful piece of local Indigenous land"
- "It's one of the few natural formations we haven't messed with yet"
- "It is the symbol of Victor Harbor"
- "The hike up to the top provides changing views of surrounding country and sea"
- "Fishing from the jetty"

# 2.6 What are some things that you WOULD CHANGE about the Bluff? (e.g. what isn't working, what could be improved?)

Some members of the community expressed desire for 'doing nothing', limiting change or 'leaving things alone'. However, taking action to protect, preserve and reinforce the character of The Bluff, is not the same as doing nothing. Responses highlighted opportunities to improve walking trails, public toilet facilities, and increase recognition of First Nations. In contrast to the responses to the (2) questions prior, interestingly, comments highlighted opportunities for commercial activation however, responses indicated development to be of a limited, low impact or temporary scale rather than large scale or intrusive development. The following highlights (11) common themes identified by participants. Themes are not provided in any particular order.

- Increased accessibility, access, links and connections, walking trails, paths and stepped access
- 2. Limited change and protection of existing
- 3. Increasing native vegetation and re-vegetation including protection of flora and fauna
- 4. Increased recognition of First Nations
- 5. Re-wild the site
- 6. Improved facilities, public toilet, improved seating areas and lookouts
- Improved jetty access (scuba, fishing, swimming & safety)
- 8. Limitations to encroachment of further development
- 9. Improved waste management and limiting impacts to environment
- 10. Improvements to roads, car parking and vehicular movements
- 11. Encouraging non-permanent/ temporary traders (pop-up, food truck, limited impact)

A snapshot of responses are provided below to illustrate 'what we heard'. Reinforcing the key themes above, comments focused on improving trails and accessibility, increased protection and preservation of the natural environment to improving facilities to allow visitors to spend more time at the Bluff.

- "Paths are tedious too bumpy"
- "Loop paths to be made for less demanding walks"
- "Interpretive signage"
- "More picnic sites"
- "The trails should be more accessible"
- "Toilets (composting) and well maintained "
- "Phone coverage"
- "Turn it into a National Park"
- "Ongoing protection of native vegetation and wildlife"
- "Leave it alone, please"
- "Keep telling the significance of the creation story and what it meant and still means to the Ngarrindjeri/Ramindjeri people"
- "Get rid of the weeds, re-wild the place with original flora, and fauna"
- "Increase small native shrubs without overshadowing the iconic shape"
- "Representation of First Nation people and their perspective"

#### 2.7 What don't you want to see happen to the Bluff?

Many respondents expressed desire for limiting commercial development. More than 60% of responses indicated a desire for restricting development, buildings or commercialism including further encroachment. Responses also focused on limiting environmental impacts such as erosion, weed management and pest control, as well as balancing mountain bike access. The following provides summary of the (6) common themes identified by participants.

- Development, buildings or commercialism
- Degradation of natural environment
- Large scale sculptures and artwork that impacts views
- Increased car parking areas that impact on the environment
- A sterilised landscape which detracts from the wild, rugged and natural beauty
- Impacts of mountain bike access

A snapshot of responses are provided below to illustrate 'what we heard'. Reinforcing the key themes above, comments focused on limiting commercial development, detracting from the natural environment and altering the character of the Bluff.

- "Any development"
- "Development of any structures other than restroom facilities. Certainly no commercial or unsightly buildings or gaudy sculptures etc"
- "Bike riding which damages the environment"
- "Destroying the water environment"
- "Over development of wharf area and surrounds"
- "Ruining its natural state"
- "Additional car parking"
- "Tourist trap ideas"
- "Don't change too much and make the mistake of making something tacky"
- "Anything that would jeopardise the integrity of the site, particularly in terms of the history
- and culture of the area"
- "A restaurant, cable-car, resort or any other development that will ruin the natural environment of the area"
- "I don't want it to lose it's character and simplicity, a quiet place to enjoy nature"
- "I don't want to see it tamed. This is a rugged landscape and must be kept so"
- "I don't wish to see the Bluff's natural assets further degraded by feral goats, weed invasion or destruction by wayward walkers or bikes"


## 2.8 What is your big idea or vision for the Bluff? (e.g. if you were developing a master plan for the Bluff, what might you suggest?)

The community was asked to share their 'Big Ideas' for the Bluff, and they did not hold back; sharing over 705 ideas. Many 'big ideas' focused on minimising development, ensuring history and culture is preserved and celebrated, whilst other 'big ideas' focused on improving access and connections. From big objectives to pragmatic considerations, a snapshot of responses are provided below to illustrate 'what we heard'.

- "A nature trail and nooks to sit and take in the view."
- "Platforms for whale watching"
- "Keep the actual Bluff as natural and untouched as possible but more picnic tables and shelter near the entrance, and where the road divides, so people can picnic"
- "Trail systems that allows for everyone to see and explore the Bluff while also protecting the natural landscape"
- "A nature trail and nooks to sit and take in the view"
- "A great recreational area for all"
- "Dedicated mountain biking"
- "Encouraging groups to gather for these activities at sunrise & sunset"
- "As natural and untouched as possible"
- "Retain its natural uniqueness and remain at one with the surrounding landscape
- "Promotion of the area as an environmentally significant area for marine life particularly the Leafy Sea Dragon"
- "Minimise visitor impacts on the site"
- "Minimal intrusive development"
- "No cars beyond the Whalers"
- "Increased and updated signage"
- "Signs indicating its significance to our First Nation people"
- "Not become developed for "our comfort" that it's charm is lost"
- "Nature playground"
- "A better/more welcoming/safer walkway from Whalers around to the Bluff jetty area instead of it seeming to be mostly for vehicles"
- "These places deserve to be left natural"
- "Improve the jetty road I'd suggest placing a gate and having foot access only for the majority of the road"
- "Stairwell and dive platform to wharf for easy access and safety"
- "More formalised walks and improved path"
- "Encourage visitation for mountain biking, trail running, hiking, climbing, abseiling"
- "On the jetty side, improve safety of road edges"
- "Rebuild or expand the current jetty"
- "NO hotels or residential or commercial facilities to be allowed to develop on or near it. Maintain its isolation and heritage and originality"
- "No more car parks consider closing the Petrel Cove large square car 'top' bitumen park and returning this large flat area to picnic open space'

## 2.9 What activities do you enjoy doing at the Bluff?

The survey asked, what activities do you enjoy at the Bluff. Guided by a number of on-site walkovers, stakeholder and Council sessions, understanding the scale and diversity of users, activities and groups is important in better understanding tension and conflicts. Responses highlighted 21% of users indicated walking as the predominant activity with 20% of responses indicated sitting and taking in the views. 65% of responses highlighted the importance of (walking, sitting and taking in the views, whale watching, picnicking and swimming). Water based users (swimming, fishing, snorkeling, surfing and kayaking) accounted for approximately 20% of users with mountain biking represented (57) times. Responses also highlighted scuba diving as an important activity reinforcing the importance of the Bluff in connecting users to the marine environment.

## 2.10 What activities would you like to be able to do at the Bluff in the future?

When asked what activities you would like to enjoy or experience in the future, responses aligned closely with activities which are already undertaken, enjoyed and available at the Bluff. Key considerations for future planning of the Bluff should not focus on filling areas with additional activities, but should aim to make small changes and adjustments that balance conflicts between users and improve existing activities. The following provides summary of the (10) common themes identified by participants.

- 1. Improved walking trails, paths, stepped access and hiking connections
- 2. Encouraging more time spent on site and enjoying the natural environment
- 3. Limited change
- 4. Improved access to marine activities (scuba, snorkeling, swimming and fishing)
- Night time activation (star gazing, walking tours, animal spotting)
- 6. Mountain bike access
- 7. Viewing areas for observing animals (whales, dolphins, birds)
- 8. Increased recognition and learning of First Nations
- 9. Availability of public toilet facilities
- 10. Areas for group activities (Outdoor painting, meditation, yoga and hosting wellness activities)

A snapshot of responses are provided below to illustrate 'what we heard'. Reinforcing the key themes above, comments focused on continuing to enjoy current activities, improving safety, improving access to marine environments, mountain biking and balancing impacts of access on the environment.

- "Be able to walk safely to the summit and get back again"
- "Same as I do now
- "Better picnic areas in appropriate spots would make me more inclined to spend more time in the area"
- "There's enough already"
- "Safer walking trails with a view to making them more child friendly"
- "Passive activities that don't require infrastructure"
- "Outdoor painting, meditation and yoga and hosting wellness activities for the community"
- "Access for snorkeling and diving from the wharf"
- "Mountain biking there are some trails which could be improved and linked to greatly enhance the riding opportunities"
- "Starry night excursion with an astronomer"
- "Continued focus on the environment and diversity"
- "Improve access to the water (balancing swimming access with habitat value) increasing access to the water"
- "Improved opportunities for bird watching"
- "Increase opportunities for active recreation"
- "Maintain and improve the trails and pathways"
- "Develop signage and interpretation"

# 2.11 Is there anything else that should be considered when developing a master plan for the Bluff?

Many respondents reinforced previous responses and reiterated a strong voice towards limiting development. The following provides summary of the (7) common themes identified by participants.


- 1. Limited change
- 2. Keeping things simple
- 3. Limiting development
- 4. Keeping nature accessible, wild and rugged
- 5. Preserving, protecting and celebrating the natural environment
- 6. Recognition, engagement and learning from First Nations
- 7. Improved boat and marine facilities (including parking)

A snapshot of responses are provided below to illustrate 'what we heard'. Reinforcing the key themes above, comments focused on continuing to enjoy current activities, improving safety, improving access to marine environments, mountain biking and balancing impacts of access on the environment.

- "Leave it as is"
- "If the intention is to add toilets please make sure they blend into the landscape"
- "Keeping it simple and not creating anything that would stick out"
- "Keep nature accessible by avoiding over developing the area"
- "Area needs to be more utilised but at the same time preserved for future generations"
- "Parking at the base of the Bluff around Whalers is often a nightmare and dominated by people with boats. Lots of non-boating people live and visit here as well."
- "Maintaining the natural landscape and wildlife"
- "Impact to the marine environment"
- "Indigenous knowledge and input"
- "Traffic flow"
- "Protect it from future developments"
- "Improved boating facilities"
- "Camping could be considered. The Petrel cove car park would make a great free-camping site if some improvements were made but I understand the implications of rubbish, security etc and it may detract from enjoyment for other visitors"
- "Learn more about its significance"
- "Natural environment is its draw card"
- "The cultural significance of this icon. Don't install a chairlift, or a zip line!"
- "Needs to be enhanced, not destroyed"
- "Preserving this very special historical icon and making it accessible to the public without spoiling its natural beauty"
- "Incorporate boating facilities, better launching and car parking"
- "Decent parking for the boat ramp"
- "We need wild places that aren't too sanitised"


## 2.12 How often do you visit the Bluff?

67% of responses indicated visitation either monthly, weekly or multiple times per week. Visiting a few times a year represented over 30% of responses with only 2% of the community indicated they do not visit the Bluff.



### 2.13 How do you usually get to the Bluff

56% of responses indicated that travel by car was the primary mode of transport with 31% indicating that they walked to the Bluff. Ongoing discussions have also indicated access by tour bus or coach.







## 3.0 Community consultation

### 3.1 Community Design workshops

As part of the community consultation process, Hatch and the City of Victor Harbor Council facilitated Community Design Workshops over Friday 27th of May and Saturday 28th of May, at the Coral Street Arts Space, located in Victor Harbor.

Free ticketed sessions were released to the community which encouraged locals, stakeholders and visitors to attend 50-minute workshops with groups of up to 15 people. Over the two-day event, more than 75+ community members were involved as part of the collaborative design and learning process. The focus of the workshops aimed to collect practical 'first hand' knowledge of the Bluff to understand the key priorities based on the feedback from the community.

Each 50-minute workshop encouraged participants to become the designer for each session, which built on responses from the community consultation survey . This was achieved through an interactive process, encouraging the community to work directly with the design team. Participants were asked to consider and reflect on their aspirations, ideas, issues, opportunities and key objectives.

A 2-hour drop in session was also held on site at the Petrel Cove shelters on Friday 27th of May, with over 35 attendees including a number of school students.

The engagement process comprised of four (4) main parts:

- 1. Part 1: Key project priorities based on (20) opportunities identified as part of the community survey.
- 2. Part 2: A 'cognitive mapping' process to understand access, tension points and user identified issues relating to walking, trails and pedestrian access.
- 3. Part 3: A 'cognitive mapping' process to better understand the key objectives of design elements such as improved walking trails, seating and rest stops and mountain biking.
- 4. Part 4: A facilitated design workshop exploring participants views in relation to issues and opportunities while exploring design ideas in real-time using sketch design, mapping and post-it notes.

The following pages provide summary of the key outcomes, considerations and opportunities identified throughout the two-day event.

## 3.2 Key priorities mapping

Twenty (20) common opportunities were identified as part of the community consultation survey responses. Opportunities ranged from improved walking trails, providing public toilets, improved viewpoints and lookouts, reducing invasive weeds and threats and better recognition of First Nations culture, histories and stories. ### 3.3 Key priorities mapping summary



### 3.4 Observations and master plan considerations

As part of the consultation exercise, participants were encouraged to add live feedback using 'Post-it Notes' to respond to images, comments or trends which were identified on the posters. Comments added, allowed the design team to test ideas in real-time with the community, to better understand concerns, opportunities and collaboratively test ideas. The following provides a summary of the key themes, discussions and commentary that was collected as part of the Community Design Workshops.

#### Trails, connections, recreation and access

- Improved walking trails, formalising existing trails to provide safer access.
- Consideration to appropriate use of surface materials to reduce safety concerns and improve walking access.
- Formalise existing trails and improve access.
- Keep trails natural, with opportunity provide 'difficult' trails to build on sense of rugged and wild landscape.

### 3.5 Landscape values and access

Community reponses identified a need to balance access requirements. To better understand this, using 'sticky dots', workshop participants were asked to place up to three (3) dots on (3) separate posters to illustrate where access could be improved, encouraged and discouraged. The process allowed for discussions to better understand community values and begin to test the capacity of these areas, review tension points, areas of safety concern and areas of significance. Mapping is based on the locations provided during the Community Design Workshops (27 May / 28 May).

The following (3) questions were asked.

#### 1. Poster 1: Where do you think walking & pedestrian access could be improved?

- Are there areas you find difficult to walk?
- Could beach access to Petrel Cove be better?
- Are there paths that could be improved?

#### 2. Poster 2: Where do you think walking & pedestrian access shouldbe encouraged?

- Should access to the top of the Bluff be encouraged?
- Are there areas you think could benefit from new walking trails?

#### 3. Poster 3: Where do you think walking & pedestrian access should be discouraged?

- Are there areas where safety is a concern?
- Are there areas where access should be limited to prevent environmental damage?
- Should access be discouraged to the top of the Bluff?





### 3.13 Issues and opportunities mapping

As part of the Community Design Workshops, **Hatch** worked collaboratively with the community to better understand the issues and opportunities associated with Bluff and how the master plan could resolve or enhance these aspects. Several of these aspects built on the findings of the community survey. Discussions identified problems, explored potential solutions and facilitated a two-way dialogue between the community around potential conflicts and solutions which needed to be addressed in the master plan. By using numbered dots to identify key locations, specific items and general objectives, a total of **122** key considerations, actions and master plan objectives were identified throughout the two-day event. Conversations built on ongoing discussions regarding access, key priorities and balancing user conflicts.

Conversations ranged from re-wilding the site, managing weeds, erosion and threats to identifying areas for improved step access, signage and trail upgrades. It is important to highlight that the items listed below are the result of open conversations with the community, critically these identified opportunities provide direction and a focus for the development of a draft master plan.



## 4.0 Master plan priorities

### 4.1 Key themes and directions

As part of both the community survey and community design workshop process, common themes, objectives and considerations have emerged. These have ranged from improved accessibility, providing spaces for contemplation and reinforcing a sense of wild and rugged landscape. The following (10) key themes provide summary of the key priorities and objectives.



#### Celebrating diverse views, vistas & outlooks

Celebrating views through improved access to key vantage points. Encouraging strong links to reinforce connection to views. Reinforcing the importance of view corridors and connections to the wider landscape. Improve access to view points.



#### Improving trails, tracks and links

Improving site connections and accessibility through appropriate walking trails, paths and stepped access to support ongoing use and limit ad hoc development of trails. Provide opportunities for diversity of trail network and loops (differing experiences, difficulty, gradients and length). Reinforcing the Bluff as a conduit for connecting the Wild South Coast Way, Heysen Trail and Victor Harbor Heritage Trail.



#### Re-wilding the Bluff

Preservation and protection the natural environment with a focus on increasing native vegetation and re-vegetation. Managing environmental threats and degradation of natural environment and keeping the site wild.



#### Limiting development and built form

Managing encroachment of development to limit further impacts on visual character. Support opportunity for improvements and upgrades within existing built form footprint.



#### Spaces for contemplation, escape and clarity

Highlighting the importance of proving places that allow for contemplation and relaxation. Providing places to think. Retaining qualities of peacefulness, tranquility, quietness, and atmosphere.



#### Ongoing connection to the landscape

A place that encourages a continual connection to the natural environment into the future.



#### Strengthening connection to rugged and wild landscape

Encourage and reinforce sense of rugged beauty. Support opportunities that encourage a continual focus on connection to the natural environment and preservation of wild coastline.



#### Discovering, uncovering and learning narratives, stories and histories

Providing opportunities for layering of cultural significance, values, histories, narratives and stories (past, present and emerging). Intertwining cultural and social values which encourage learning, inclusion and engagement. Providing opportunities for increased recognition of First Nations. Providing opportunities that encourage ongoing learning and listening. Provide spaces which support investigation, encouraging a 'dig deeper' approach.



### Enhancing connection to marine environment

Balance access to the ocean, beaches and marine environments (surfing, swimming, scuba, snorkeling, kayaking) with preservation, protection and promotion of marine environment. Review opportunities for providing improved facilities and opportunities to support diverse water based activities.



#### Balance diversity of users

Review opportunities to enhance visitor experience through appropriate management of user conflicts (walking, cycling, vehicular movements, access, tourisml

The information provided as part of the community survey, stakeholder sessions and Community Design Workshops will guide the draft master plan, interventions and projects.
